## Porter-Broward Taskforce Needs Your Ideas!

Our congregation has once again received a major grant from the Mary Porter Designated fund of the Community Foundation of Broward. As you may recall from previous years, the Session has established the following guidelines for use of the grant:

- **Enhancement of current ministries, which would include any of the following:** (1) Special one-time programs, concerts, lectures, or other ministry events or expenses over and above the present ministries funded by the General Fund. (2) Grant-funded ministry such as a part-time parish nurse position, and (3) seed money for new ministries.
- **Capital Improvements to our facilities that would have one of the following purposes:** Conserve energy consumption, reduce the environmental impact of our facilities and ministries, or increase accessibility and/or safety for members and visitors to these facilities.
- **Contributions to other ministries and non-profit organizations** that impact children and families or the quality of life of the greater Pottstown area.

If you have an idea that meets one of these criteria, let Carter and Kerry know and they will pass it on to the taskforce that will be studying the needs and making recommendations to Session later this Spring. **Please turn in your ideas by April 16.**

## Health Ministry News

Medicare is mailing new Medicare cards starting in April 2018. This will be done systematically over the span of a year. Here are 10 things to know about your new Medicare Card

1. **Mailing takes time:** Your card may arrive at a different time than a friend or neighbor's.
2. **Shred your old Medicare care:** Once you get your new one destroy the old one and use the new card right away.
3. **Guard your card:** Only give your new number to healthcare people you trust. Never give out any information over the phone. There are many scams involving the new card. CMS will never call you on the phone and ask for your personal information.
4. **Your Medicare Number is unique:** Your card has your own unique number now instead of your social security number.
5. **Your new card is paper:** Paper cards are easier for providers to use and save money. You are also able to print your own replacement card if you need one.
6. **Keep your new card with you.**
7. **Your healthcare providers know you will be getting a new card.**
8. **You can find your number:** If you forget your new card, you or your healthcare provider may be able to look up your Medicare Number online.
9. **Keep your Medicare Advantage Card:** If you're in a Medicare Advantage Plan (like an HMO or PPO), this card is your main card for Medicare. However, you may be asked to show your new Medicare card, so carry both.
10. **Help is available:** If you don't get your new Medicare card by **April 2019**, call 1-800-MEDICARE. If you have any other questions or concerns, see me and we will find the answers together!

## **Living Generously – Your Mission Giving at Work**

The mission of “Recycling Services understands the critical need to educate the public and to create a market for recycled products. Our vision is to become a community-based, self-contained recycling center. RSI has made a moral decision to provide an educational program that is essential to life itself. We strive to provide a center where recycling will create new products from old ones, and to preserve the rich heritage of the earth for future generations through other projects including organic farming, renewable resources and land preservation.” In 1971 the Ecology Club at Owen Roberts High School under the leadership of Jim Crater became Recycling Services Inc. (RSI) located on Elm Street in Pottstown. This April 22<sup>nd</sup> will mark its 44<sup>th</sup> year of existence and, with the passionate leadership of president Jim Crater, has become and will continue to be one the oldest and most respected recycling and alternative energy resources centers in the Northeast.

For most of his life, Jim has been calling for everyone to live “lightly on the planet.” To accomplish this, Recycling Services collects over 50 different types of glass, plastic, cardboard, paper, metals, electronics, and textiles. Besides recycling, RSI is also an alternative energy resource center for anyone interested in solar, wind, and/or other energy sources. Recently Jim’s son, Jesse, has become the general manager of RSI and has helped to renew interest in using materials locally, especially for art. Now it is a destination for an increasing number of artists and entrepreneurs seeking raw materials such as cork, wine bottles, etc.

Recycling drop-off is Saturday from 9am to 1pm. The gate fee is \$15. While there you can browse through the used book trailer as well as other for sale items. Monthly tours are held Saturdays from 11am to 12pm where the public can see what RSI collects and how it operates. It is free with a suggested \$10 donation to help with outreach.
