Letter from the Co-Pastors

"What is the kingdom of God like? What shall I compare it to?

—Luke 13:18

Dearly Beloved,

As we have noted in our preaching series this Lent, Jesus asks more than 100 questions in the four gospels. Jesus, the Master Teacher, uses questions to cause his disciples and listeners to think, reflect, engage, and commit. Here in Luke 13 we get a rare break as Jesus answers his own questions—but his answer serves the same purpose of making us think and reflect because he answers with parables. The Kingdom of God is like a tiny mustard seed that grows into a tree large enough for birds to make nests in its branches. Or, Jesus says, the Kingdom of God can be compared to yeast that a woman mixes into her flour to leaven it.

Often in our culture, faith is described in black and white, cut and dried terms. But, as Stephanie Paulsell points out in a recent article, Jesus here portrays faith as involving more imaginative and creative work. We have to pay attention, look more deeply and use our imaginations, because "the Kingdom of God is doing its secret work in hidden places. The ordinary miracles of growth and transformation are still happening even when we cannot yet see the outcome." The bottom line, according to Jesus in these parables, is that "the Kingdom of God is pervasive and transformative, and once it has been added, it cannot be separated out."

In this season of Lent, may we recognize that though the ways of God may seem small and weak, a little bit of yeast <u>can</u> cause dough to rise. And although it may appear that nothing is happening, tiny seeds <u>do</u> turn into large trees. With God, grace <u>can</u> outweigh sin, and the cross <u>does</u> turn into the empty tomb.

Even now, the Kingdom of God is doing its secret work in hidden places. Therefore we dare live with faith in the midst of apathy, hope in the midst of fear, and love in the midst of indifference. And we trust that by the grace and power of God, the miracle of growth and transformation can be happening in us even now, even though we cannot yet see the outcome.

Family Faith Formation

I am currently wrestling with a book entitled "I Wonder: Engaging a Child's Curiosity about the Bible" by Elizabeth Caldwell. Music Notes

Be listening for comforting Lenten music from the keyboards and choirs for much of this month, and also exciting sounds of joy as we worship the Lord Jesus on Palm Sunday and Easter. We'll begin the month with two arrangements from our Chancel Handbell Choir, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" and "Blessed Assurance." Deb will offer contemplations on the hymn tunes "Near the Cross" and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." But Lenten pieces are not all quiet and serene. "O The Deep, Deep Love of Jesus" has passionate changes in tempo and mood, from delicate to fiery. The Chancel Choir's selection, "Coming Home," is an original prayerful ballad by Mary McDonald paired with a beloved gospel hymn text by William Kirkpatrick, expressing the return to the Father like the story of the prodigal son. It's an anthem of repentance and forgiveness.

The Lenten Service of Wholeness prelude reminds us of God's eternal promise to us, "You Are Mine." Jo Ann Bathurst will serve as the soloist for the Lenten Service of Wholeness as well.

All of the choirs in our music ministry will offer selections during the Palm Sunday service. The Chancel Handbells will open the service with Douglas Wagner's "Hosanna in the Highest." The Cherubs and Celtic Singers will present their offering followed by Faure's "The Palms." Rob Land will be featured as the baritone soloist. The organ postlude is an arrangement of "Ellacombe."

The Maundy Thursday prelude is a quietly heart-wrenching arrangement of "O Sacred Head Now Wounded." which will be followed by several haunting choral arrangements of "When Jesus Wept," "No Other Lamb," "Set Me As a Seal," "He was Wounded for Our Transgressions," and Richard Frost's "Out of the Depths." John Genther will close the service with "Were You There."

Other organ pieces featured during this month of reflection and repentance will include a Scarlatti fugue, a jig and a solfeggio.

Our Easter Sunday services will be filled with joyous musical offerings. Gary James will be organizing and rehearsing the "congregational instrumentalists" for the sunrise service. The Chancel Choir's prelude to the 8:30 and 10:30 services will be the glorious "Te Deum" by John Rutter with brass, organ and timpani. The choir will also offer Pote's "Forth He Came at Easter" with brass and piano accompaniment. Jo Ann Bathurst will be directing the children's choirs during the 10:30 service. Our Brass ensemble, featuring trumpets, Richard Strunk, and Guy Keenan; trombones, Henry Yorgey and Patrick Sample; and tuba, Daniel Foust, will also be accompanying the congregation during the hymns and the singing of Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus." After that we will all need to batten down the hatches for the Easter organ postlude, Widor's "Toccata."


Easter Flowers
