Letter from the Co-Pastors

“Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished.” —Mt. 4:1-2

“After being baptized by John in the river Jordan, Jesus went off alone into the wilderness where he spent forty days asking himself the question what it meant to be Jesus. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves.” —Frederick Buechner

Dearly Beloved,

What are your associations with Lent? Do you think of it primarily as a time to give up sweets or other goodies? Do you think of it as a morose time when we are supposed to focus on our sins and avoid being too joyful? Or perhaps, does it seem something that only Catholics do, and you wonder is there any point for Protestants?

Lent, the season of 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, comes from the old English word that refers to the slow lengthening of days that leads to springtime. Like seeds in the ground, we are preparing and waiting to pop forth from the ground with the first signs of spring. Lent, for Christians, is intended to be a time of preparation, waiting, and growth, as we look forward to Easter and the promise of the resurrection and new life. As Buechner observes, we are asking in one way or another what it means to be ourselves. Or to put it another way, we are asking, How can I be more like Jesus, more like the person God created me to be? For we are our truest selves when we are the selves God created us to be.

Lent is a time not to set aside joy, but a time to set aside complacency, to move God from the periphery of our lives to the center, to prune out those parts of our lives that prevent us from growing, and to deepen our roots so that we can stay strong and alive even in fallow or dry times. Lent is a journey towards the cross—and the empty tomb, towards spring and the light.

We hope that beginning with Ash Wednesday on March 1, you will set aside complacency and use this season of Lent as a time of preparation and growth, joining us for worship on Sunday, taking advantage of the offerings for prayer, fellowship, and growth on Wednesdays, and finding time for self-examination, prayer, and sharing with others during these 40 days. Let us do this, not with moroseness or despair because of how full of sin we are, but with expectation and hope because of how full of grace God is.

- Welcomed Karen Stacks to serve as Clerk pro tem.
- Reviewed and received the minutes of the annual congregational meeting.
- Reviewed and approved with slight revisions the Ministry Information Form developed by the Search Committee for the Associate Pastor position.
- Did not receive the January Treasury Report as Michelle Thompson was ill.
- Received an update on the labyrinth. Installation is to begin the week after Easter. The three benches have been ordered.
- Approved Carter and Kerry attending worship on Sunday April 23 at Second Presbyterian Church in Richmond to witness their grandchild's baptism. Approved Barry Moyer to preach and lead worship that Sunday.
- Approved the baptism of Kinley Jane Feroe, child of God and daughter of Dana and Tim Feroe, on Sunday, March 19.
- Approved the 2016 Statistical Report.
- Approved three projects recommended by the Administrative Committee to come from Capital Improvement as funded by the Endowment: (1) Replacement of the Evan Street door. The current door is more than 50 years old, is not airtight, and the door opener is no longer working reliably. (2) Installation of five wireless thermostats for five heating/cooling units that are presently not controlled by a thermostat but must be turned off and on manually. Installation of the thermostats should result in significant energy savings. (3) Replacement of tiles on the landings and hallway leading to the choir.
- Approved the job descriptions for the ordained Associate Pastor for Children and Youth position and the non-ordained Director for Children and Youth position.

Music Notes

Lent is a season of reflection, prayer, and repentance. I pray the music chosen lends your ear to hear God and seek to recognize and respond to His presence in your life and in our world, throughout your Lenten journey.

Our Ash Wednesday service, held in the community room, begins with Deb playing “Reflections in the River” by Keesecker. The anthem, Dan Forrest’s “His Robes for Mine,” will be sung by our men’s quartet comprised of Chip DePrefontaine, Andy Lane, Rob Land and Rob Wade. Leanne Campbell, flutist, will also join us during this service.

On March 5th, Communion Sunday, the Chancel Handbells will open the service with a beautiful arrangement of “God So Loved The World.” Eric Unruh’s “Kyrie Eleison” will be performed by the Chancel Choir during this first Sunday of Lent. Deb will offer “O Lord, Now Let Your Servant” arranged by Hobby as the offertory, and Parker’s “Be Known to Us in Breaking Bread” and Raney’s “When I Survey the Wondrous Cross” on the piano during Communion. The service will conclude with Dengler’s “At the Foot of the Cross” as the choir’s benediction response and Bruckner’s “Postlude” on the organ.

The prelude, “Lord, Thy Goodness Reigns” by C.P.E. Bach will open the service on Sunday, March 12th. The Cherubs will sing “John 3:16” as this week’s anthem. The beloved hymn “God So Loved the World” by Stainer, will fill the sanctuary as the Chancel Choir’s offertory. Deb will complete the service with Telemann’s “Be of Good Courage.”

Sunday, March 19th’s service begins with the classical prelude “Andante” by Handel. “The Walk to Calvary” will be sung by the Celtic Singers as the anthem while the Chancel Choir will offer Brad Nix’s arrangement of “What Love is This,” which is based on “Wondrous Love” from Walker’s Southern Harmony, as the offertory. Widor’s “March from the Third Organ Symphony” will close the service as the postlude..

Our final service for the month, March 26th, begins with Mark Hayes’ “My Jesus, I Love Thee” as the prelude. The Chancel Choir will offer Thomson’s “My Shepherd Will Supply My Need.” Deb will play “O Blessed Spring” by Cherwien as the offertory and “Symphony in B Flat” by Begue as the postlude.

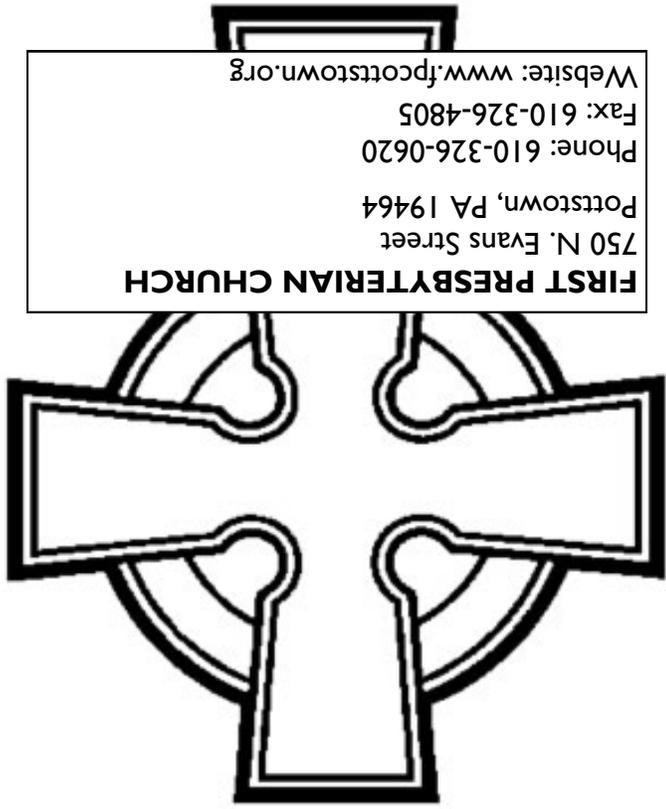
Invite a Friend Sunday, April 9
