Letter from the Co-Pastors

“Do you the people of the church, on behalf of the church universal, promise to support and encourage this child and these parents, by prayer and example, by nurture and fellowship, to the end that we may mature as faithful Christians?”

Dearly Beloved,

It is the week after Easter. We have just rejoiced in God’s raising Jesus Christ from the dead, and in the promise that in him, we too are raised to new life. At the time of writing this, we are packing to head down to Richmond for our granddaughter’s baptism at Second Presbyterian Church. How fitting in this Easter season to mark Josie’s being raised to new life in the waters of baptism!

We are reminded again of the question asked of the congregation at our own, and each child’s, baptism: “Do you promise to support this child and these parents ...?” Our answer as a congregation seals the solemn promise we make before God to each child and his or her parent(s). And of course, those parents make their own solemn promise “to live the Christian faith, and teach that faith to their child...” All of us make these promises undergirded by the grace of God whose promise to us through Jesus Christ “is to be with us until the end of the age.”

In this season of resurrection life, we are moved to give thanks for all of the servants who help us keep these promises: Sunday School teachers and youth advisors; Young Children and Worship leaders and childcare volunteers; parents and Spiritual Formation Committee members. With our current staff vacancy, these servants, under Bill DuPree’s leadership, shoulder greater responsibilities than usual. Sarah Pinard has also helped us keep our baptismal promises in her service with the Sunday School and Music and Recreation ministries. What a difference her Sunday School newsletter has made in facilitating communication and supporting our dedicated teachers!

Please keep our Search Committee in your prayers as they seek to fill this position. As you will see later in this newsletter, the committee is at the point of reviewing the “Personal Information Forms” and resumes of candidates, and considering whom to interview. As we have stated before, the first priority for the committee, Session, and pastors is to discern the best person to work with our children and youth and their families, whether or not they are an ordained Associate Pastor or a non-ordained Director for Children and Youth. We know God has someone in mind for us and we are looking forward to seeing whom that might be.

But as important as this new staff person will be for our children and youth and families, he or she is no more important than all of the members of this congregation who take an interest in our young people and serve in various ways to help them live the new life of Christ. Let us pray for the Search Committee, our children and youth and families, and find time to thank those who help us all keep our promises.

Porter-Broward Taskforce Needs Your Ideas!

Our congregation has once again received a major grant from the Mary Porter Designated fund of the Community Foundation of Broward. As you may recall from this past year, the Session has established the following guidelines for use of the grant:

- **Enhancement of current ministries, which would include any of the following:** (1) Special one-time programs, concerts, lectures, or other ministry events or expenses over and above the present ministries funded by the General Fund. (2) Grant-funded ministry such as a part-time parish nurse position, and (3) seed money for new ministries.
- **Capital Improvements to our facilities that would have one of the following purposes:** Conserve energy consumption, reduce the environmental impact of our facilities and ministries, or increase accessibility and/or safety for members and visitors to these facilities.
- **Contributions to other ministries and non-profit organizations** that impact children and families or the quality of life of the greater Pottstown area.

If you have an idea that meets one of these criteria, let Carter and Kerry know and they will pass it on to the taskforce that will be studying the needs and making recommendations to Session in June. **Please turn in your ideas by May 7.**

Search Committee Update

The Search Committee met on Thursday, April 20, and received the second phase of helpful training from two representatives of the Commission on Ministry. The Committee is now receiving Personal Information Forms (think of them as six-page resumes with short theological essays) from the our denomination's national computer "matching service." We are also receiving PIFs and resumes directly from candidates who have seen the posting of the job opening.

We have received more than 50 inquiries so far, with more expected. We will review them and winnow down the list before conducting first, "Skype" interviews, and then after further winnowing, face-to-face interviews. Much progress has been made but we still have a ways to go as you can see. Please understand that we need to keep confidentiality through the process.

The Committee is so grateful for the meals that have been prepared for our weekly meetings by a crew coordinated by Debbie Remelius. Since some of us have to come right from work to the meetings, the meals are greatly appreciated! Please keep us in your prayers.

"Taste of Ministry" Summer Intern—Connor Ferreri

Studies have shown that one of the most significant experiences shared by men and women who enter the ministry is some opportunity each was given to delve into the experience of ministry during their college years. So several years ago, the Session established a summer intern opportunity for a college student who wants to explore parish ministry as a vocation. Using an anonymous gift, the Session funded its first "Taste of Ministry," and Elizabeth Remelius became our first intern.

This summer, Connor Ferreri will become our second! Currently a student at The College of Wooster, a Presbyterian-related college in Ohio, Connor will draw alongside us from May to August, and step into different roles of ministry. Sometimes he will be an observer, sometimes a participant, and sometimes a leader. He will assist with planning Mission Mornings and the Family Camp, accompany us on pastoral visits, join in worship leadership, step in with Community Meals, perhaps teach a Sunday School class, and work about 10 hours/week. And we will read some books and reflect on ministry together. We don't have to ask you to "be nice to Connor;" you already have been, which is one of the reasons he is considering ministry in the first place!

News from the Library

The movie is based on the real life couple Mildred and Richard Loving from Virginia who were arrested 1960s because they were an interracial couple. Their case went all the way to the Supreme Court. If you have been a part of the Conversations on Race group or, even, if you have not been, it will be a movie worthwhile to see.


