Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dearly Beloved:

Whether we are Democrat, Republican, or Independent, there are two stories, two narratives about life which compete for our attention and loyalty, not only this Fall in this election season, but throughout our lives. The first narrative centers on "more" and insists that "more is always better" - whether it is more income, more "stuff," bigger savings accounts or bigger houses. In this narrative, no matter how much we have, it is never quite enough for our happiness, or safety, or security. If we had more, then we would be happy, safe, and secure. When this cultural narrative captures our attention, we focus more on things and less on people; we pay more attention to what others have that we do not have, and so we are never content. Studies show that having more and making more have very little correlation with being happy. Sadly, studies show that winners of the lottery have a spike of happiness but after about six months, they are no happier than they were before winning the lottery.

The second narrative competing for our attention and loyalty is the gospel story. In the gospel, we are told that life does not consist in the abundance of things, that it is more blessed to give than to receive, that people count more than things, and that we find true meaning, purpose, and joy in living our life, not for ourselves, but for others. When the gospel captures our attention, we focus <u>not</u> on what we lack but on what we have, and on how God has blessed us in so many ways, especially through the gift of his Son. When we listen to the gospel story, we find it possible to be content <u>whatever</u> our circumstances might be: "for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances, I have learned the secret of ...having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Phil. 4:11-13).

This November, may we cast our vote for which voice we are going to listen to, which story we are going to follow—not when we go to the polls, but when we fill out our pledge cards and make our commitments of our time, talents, and money for the coming year. May we vote for the gospel by following the example of Jesus Christ "who became poor that we might be rich." May we vote for the gospel by counting our blessings with gratitude and being aware of all that God has given us. May we vote for the gospel by "letting our blessings flow" from God, through us, to others, for "it is in losing our lives that we save them," and it is in giving that we will find our greatest joy, purpose, and peace.

Brian K. Blount is the president and professor of New Testament at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA, and Charlotte, NC. He was called to this position in 2007, after serving for 15 years as the Richard J. Dearborn Professor of New Testament Interpretation at Princeton Theological Seminary.

A graduate of William and Mary, Princeton Seminary, and Emory Univerrsity (PhD), Dr. Blount's primary areas of study are in the Gospel of Mark and the Book of Revelation, and he is the author of six books. Kerry and Carter are graduates of Union. Dr. Blount will be joined by his wife, Sharon, and he will also speak in the Sunday School hour in the Community Room about training future leaders of the church.

- Received reports from the Mission Committee regarding money collected for SNEHA, an update on Habitat for Humanity's plans for Pottstown, and successful completion of the "scouting trip" to Honduras for our next installation projects.

Music Notes:

As November approaches, let us be reminded to "sing and make music in our hearts to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 5:19-20.) On November 6th, for the All Saints Sunday service, we will begin with the Chancel Handbells playing a sensitive and expressive arrangement of the wonderful spiritual, "My Lord, What A Morning", by Dan Edwards. Mark Hayes' arrangements of "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" and "Holy Ground" will be offered by the Chancel Choir and Deb Voytko as this week's anthem and offertory.

You might have noticed the name "Mark Hayes", as it appears in the bulletin quite often! Mark is an award-winning concert pianist, composer, arranger and conductor. His personal catalog, totaling over 1,000 published works, includes work for solo voice, solo piano, multiple pianos, orchestra, jazz combo, small instrumental ensembles, and choruses of all kinds. He has conducted orchestras performing his work at Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center. In 2010, Baylor University Center for Christian Music Studies awarded Mark the Award for Exemplary Leadership in Christian Music. In June 2010 Mark released his first CD of original songs titled All Is Well, featuring Kansas City jazz artist, Monique Danielle. Whether concertizing on the other side of the globe or composing at his home in Kansas City, Missouri, Mark is blessed to live out his mission "to create beautiful music for the world" - and he certainly has!!

Karg-Elert's "Praise the Lord with Drums and Cymbals" will bring us into worship on Sunday, November 13th, as Deb's organ prelude. Our Cherubs and Celtic Singers will offer an anthem and Gilpin's gospel setting of "How Can I Keep from Singing" will be sung by the Chancel Choir during the offertory. The organ postlude will be Scarlatti's "Allegro."


