Letter from the Co-Pastors

There is much to talk about this month!

First, and most importantly, we hope you can join us on Sunday, October 2, as we say good bye to Jeff. We will do that officially by voting in a congregational meeting "to consent to his request for dissolution of the relationship," so he can return to the Midwest and take a call to serve a congregation in Wisconsin. Then we will go downstairs for cake and some fun. We are grateful for Jeff's love and care for our youth and children during his time with us, and we look forward to celebrating his ministry at FPC. Come eat, drink, and be merry!

We also want to say how grateful we are for all of the servants who work with our children and youth. They have offered to take on more administrative responsibilities in the interim between associate pastors. Not all of the transition details have been worked out, but we know our children and youth will be in good hands this year! Later this Fall, an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee will be put together. This is how it works: as with the election of our elders and deacons, the Nominating Committee will present a slate of people to be elected by the congregation. If you have someone you want to nominate for the search committee, contact our Nominating Chair, Sharon Holloway, or either one of us. Please be aware that the time commitment is not insignificant (when they are reviewing data forms for prospective ministers, the committee will probably meet weekly), but those who have served in this capacity have found it very rewarding.

It is not only our congregation which is going through a transition, but also our country, as we prepare to elect a new President. At the request of several church members, we will lead an informal time of prayer in the sanctuary on Wednesdays from 7:00-7:30 p.m., beginning Oct. 12. This, of course, will not be a time for partisanship, but will be simply an opportunity to pray for this country, its leaders, and its people. We hope you will join us.

Finally, we are always looking for ways we can be good neighbors and work for the common good in our community. At Session meeting this week, we were able to share two developments. First, a Facebook page has been formed to link up the north end of Pottstown. Please look for "Pottstown's North End" page and "like" it, as we work to build stronger ties with our immediate neighbors. And we continue to seek how we can build greater understanding and ties on racial matters. If you are interested in being a part of a group to explore these issues, let us know. We hope to let you know soon about a bus trip to the breathtaking new Smithsonian museum of African American history with one of our neighboring churches. We will keep you posted!

Music Notes

The music ministry has selected several glorious pieces for our October 2nd World Communion Service. The Chancel Choir will begin with Mary McDonald's "Be Still," as our 3rd graders accept the invitation to the Lord's table. As the service continues, the choir will perform Dennis Eliot's "Bread of the World" as the anthem. During the offertory, Deb will play Mark Hayes' "Thy Word." Cherwien's "We Come to the Hungry Feast" and Osterland's "Now We Join in Celebration" will be heard during communion. We will close the service with the Fourfold Amen followed by Hobby's "Recessional in G" on the organ.

The Chancel Choir's anthem "Take My Life and Walk with Me" will reflect our mission emphasis during the October 9th service. Arranged by Patti Drennan, the text was penned by Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-1879). The daughter of a church rector, she was raised in Worcester, England. In her love of learning, she grew to become an able scholar and a talented singer and pianist. The deepest desire of her heart, however, was in "personal spiritual influence upon others." She expended the majority of her life's labors in writing prose and poetry that would be spiritually beneficial to the saints. In Havergal's own words, "Take My Life and Walk with Me is a "consecration hymn" in which the singer commits all of her possessions and being to the Lord for his purposes. It expresses what each of us ought to feel and long for, even if at times we see so much disparity between the words and our actual state that we have to sing most of it in hope and faith." Deb will round out the service with several selections, "Praise the Lord with Drums and Cymbals" Karg-Elert (prelude), "Isn't He" arranged by Hayes (offertory) and Powell's "God is our Refuge and Strength" (postlude). **Cont. on p. 10**

At its September meeting, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns
- Voted to make a financial contribution to First Baptist's efforts to tear down its church tower.
- Approved celebration of the Lord's Supper on the upcoming Women's Retreat and on the upcoming Senior High Seekers overnight.
- Elected Tom Zeigler to serve on a Mission Study Team.
- Heard about plans by the pastors to start a time of prayer in response to requests of church members. There will be an opportunity for informal, non-partisan prayer for the country and election on Wednesdays beginning Wednesday, October 12 at 7 p.m. in the sanctuary.
- Approved a covenant of closure with Jeff.
- Received the Treasurers' Report and voted to pay two-thirds of the allocations owed to Mission and Capital Improvement.
- Took time to look over the past program year and name accomplishments and blessings in our ministry to celebrate and give thanks for to God.
- Received a report from the Administrative Committee that the playground equipment has not yet been installed because of a delay in getting the building permit from the Borough of Pottstown. The Administrative Committee reported on a number of projects being underway or completed by church members (Peace Garden bench repairs, removal of a dead dogwood tree, painting of offices, refurbishment of the Mary Ann Yost room, repair and painting of the men's room, and replacement of damaged library lights). The sanctuary chancel lights will be replaced with LED lights in late October or early November.
- Approved use of designated Memorial Fund gifts to purchase materials for new choir stoles and to purchase a lamp for the sanctuary piano.
- Closed in prayer for Jeff since it was his last Session meeting.

 - Administrative: For successful completion of the playground project.

 - Spiritual Formation: For guidance and encouragement for our volunteers.
 - Stewardship: That our vision for stewardship will bear fruit.
 - Nominating: For discernment for the committee and those asked to serve as leaders.

Health Ministry News

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an important time to learn about the risks we women face. Other than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women. About 1 in 8 women will find out she has breast cancer at some point in her life. When breast cancer is diagnosed early and treated, survival rates can be near 100 percent. That is why **regular screenings and quality treatment** are critical. Talk to a doctor about your risk for breast cancer, especially if a close family member of yours had breast or ovarian cancer. Your doctor can help you decide when and how often to get mammograms. Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, most cancer screenings are offered at no or low out-of-pocket costs. Women should talk with their health care providers about their individual risk factors and what tests are right for them.

On October 16th, the Chancel Handbells will begin the service with the prelude, “I Want Jesus to Walk With Me” by Tammy Waldrop. The Chancel Choir will offer the anthem “Jesus, Your Name” by Keith and Kristyn Getty, arranged by Lloyd Larson. We also look forward to hearing from the children’s choirs during this service. Deb will offer the postlude “Recessional in C” by Hopson.

J.S. Bach’s “Prelude in G Major” will be heard as the opening selection to the October 23rd service. The Chancel Choir will offer Faure’s “Cantique de Jean Racine” arranged by John Rutter. The Cantique is a chant written by Jean Racine, a 17th century French playwright, which was paraphrased from a Latin hymn from the breviary of matins (monastic nighttime liturgy). Faure, at the age of 19, used Racine’s chant as a theme in a composition he entered in a competition, which won first prize. The work shows similarities to his famous, Requiem and two are often programmed together. Deb continues the musical selections with “As the Deer”, arranged by Hayes, during the offertory and Pachelbel’s “Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow” as the postlude.

On Sunday, October 30th, we celebrate, Reformation! Deb will begin the service with “A Mighty Fortress” arranged by Hobby. The Choir and Bagpipes will process and we will lift our voices in song and praise knowing that our lives and our work have purpose because through them we serve our God.

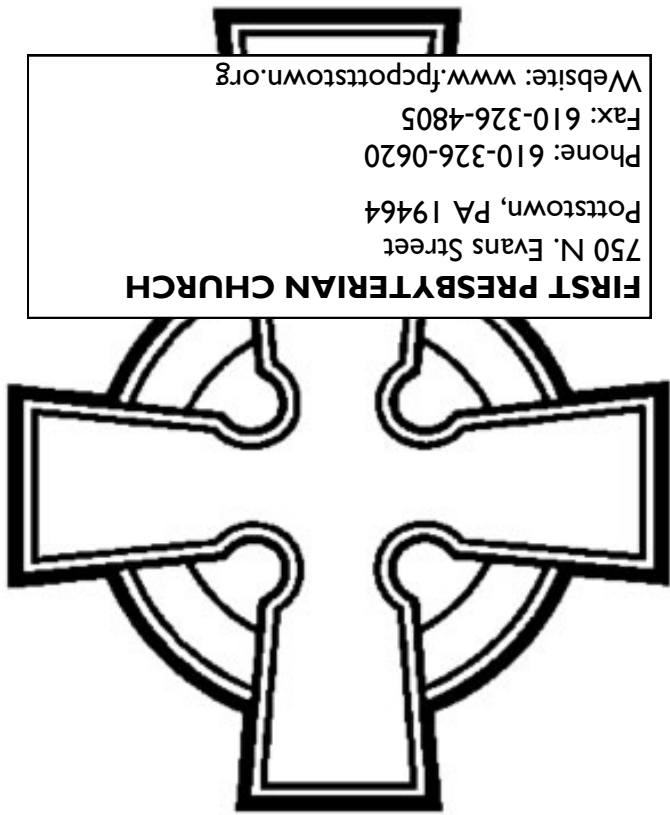
