Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dear Friends,

As we have gone shopping for Christmas cards this year, we are reminded of something author Philip Yancey wrote: "Sorting through the stack of cards that arrived at our house last Christmas, I note that all kinds of symbols have edged their way into the celebration. Overwhelmingly, the landscape scenes render New England towns buried in snow, usually with the added touch of a horse-drawn sleigh. On other cards, animals frolic: not only reindeer but also chipmunks, raccoons, cardinals and cute gray mice. ...Inside, the cards stress sunny words like ...cheer, happiness and warmth. It is a fine thing, I suppose, that we honor a sacred holiday with such ...sentiments. And yet when I turn to the gospel accounts of the first Christmas, I hear a very different tone..."

The gospels present us with images for this season that are different from frolicking animals and horse-drawn carriages — lovely as these things are. The gospels give us images like an old man waiting in darkness, a young girl bowing her head in solitude, shepherds and stables, strange occurrences in the heavens, and stranger occurrences here on earth. The gospels sound a *tone* that is different from the tone sounded in the world around us: it is not loud and blaring, but quiet, mystified, reverent. The gospels tell us to *do* things that are different from what the world around us is doing: to wait, to ponder, to prepare, to marvel.

The gospels give us a different, an alternative script to live by — in every season, but particularly in this season of Advent. It is the script about God's life intertwining with our own. In the church, we read this script every time we gather. One writer has said that this is what brings people to church, to hear this alternative script which sees and hears and directs life differently from the world around us. This alternative script claims that "there is at work among us a Truth that makes us safe, that makes us free, that makes us joyous in a way that the comfort and ease of the consumer economy cannot even imagine."

In Advent, in the church, we tear ourselves away from the script which the world hands us, and we focus once again on the script God is writing. In Advent, we prepare to meet that Truth that makes us safe and free and joyous, the Truth which takes on flesh and dwells among us in the One who comes.

Rather than snow-covered landscapes and frolicking animals, one alternate image to hold before us in this season is the one depicted not on a greeting card, but in the banner which will hang in the lobby during the Advent season. At the bottom of the banner is a crowd of people, presented in dark hues of blue and purple. With arms stretching upwards, the people turn and reach for a light which streams from the upper right-hand corner from somewhere, *Someone* beyond the visible boundaries of the frame. Let us, like those figures, orient our lives towards this light, once again. Let us do what God's script tells us to do in this season: wait, ponder, prepare, and marvel, so that we can meet the Truth which makes us safe, free, and joyous, and God's life can intertwine with our own. The new "bookmobile" will be visiting our children's Sunday School rooms with great books to check out from our library.


