## Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dearly Beloved:

We often describe ourselves as a four-generation congregation, because unlike some congregations, we truly are a multi-generation congregation. Last September we preached a four-part series entitled “Generation to Generation.” That preaching series dealt with a number of faith issues that are common to all of the generations. For example, we found that when we met with each generation and asked, “What is the best thing about being your age?”, nearly everyone spoke of some aspect of freedom, whether it is the freedom of a drivers’ license, or the freedom of retirement. Conversely, when we asked, “What is the worst thing about being your age?”, nearly all of you spoke of limits, whether it was parental restrictions or physical limitations.

There is much that is common to our lives and faith journeys, no matter what age we are. But being of different generations also poses challenges. We have grown up in different times and have had different experiences. We are at different stages of life with different responsibilities, challenges, opportunities, and questions. Not surprisingly, we often dress differently, have different musical tastes, different struggles and blessings in our faith journeys, and different expectations concerning the church. While it is a blessing and gift to have these differences, it would also help if we could better understand each other and see the world through each others’ eyes.

Beginning January 10, two of the adult classes will be combining to explore together how we might “bridge the generations” and get a better glimpse of each generation’s challenges and perspectives. We will have a variety of speakers, including church staff, church members and outside speakers in what we hope will be a fruitful time together. We will look at the different stages and passages that most, if not all, adults go through. We will look at how the times have changed and how that has impacted different generations differently. And we will take a closer look at what the world and God look like to younger adults, middle aged adults, and older adults.

We undertake this exploration together not just to have some extra psychological and sociological knowledge, but so that we will grow in our faith and in our understanding of those around us who make up different generations—whether it is our parents or children, our co-workers or neighbors, or our brothers and sisters in this congregation.

If you are not already involved in a Sunday School class, come and join us. The more the merrier! “From generation to generation, we will recount your praise.”

At its December 15 meeting, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns.
- Witnessed a presentation by Liv of an example of a “Children and Worship” devotion offered to the children in “downstairs worship” on Sundays.
- Received notice that the church has recently received proceeds from a trust.
- Elected Ron Gower to serve as Clerk of Session beginning in February.
- Received the good news that the Nominating Committee has nearly completed its work in preparation for the annual meeting in January.
- Received reports from the Stewardship Committee and Treasurer (summary of the financial report is on p. 10). Approved a payment of \$9167 for this month’s mission allocation.
- Received the report and recommendations of the Audit Committee.
- Approved payment of attorneys’ fees related to legal proceedings as a trust beneficiary.
- Received an update from the Administrative Committee regarding its investigation of replacing the current HVAC system in the Christian Education wing which may be on its last legs. The Administrative Committee is also investigating the need for surge protection to protect the organ electronics in case of lightning.
- Received an update concerning the volunteers from our church who will be traveling to New Orleans in February.
- Discussed in detail the proposed Child Safety policy recommended by a church taskforce. Questions were raised about some of the definitions in the policy and the matter was referred to attorney Picardi with hopes of reviewing and approving the policy in January.
- Approved sponsoring a “Financial Peace” seminar to be offered at the church with Rob Wade coordinating.
- Received reports from the Administrative, Worship, Stewardship, Christian Education, Endowment, Fun and Fellowship, Membership, Mission, and Nominating committees and from Deacons.
