Letter from the Co-Pastors

*"I am so distant from the hope of myself,
in which I have goodness, and discernment,
and never hurry through the world
but walk slowly, and bow often..."*

This year, we are ready for Lent. Most years, Lent comes earlier in the year. Then, we have barely 'put away' Christmas, it seems, and it is time to prepare for Lent. But this year, Easter comes as late in its cycle as it can, and so the 40-day season of preparation leading up to it, beginning with Ash Wednesday, comes later too. This year, we find we are ready for it.

It isn't only bodies that get lethargic and lazy in winter, foregoing the exercise and nutrients they need, reaching instead for the potato chips from the sunken cushion on the couch. A soul can get lazy, too. A spirit can turn down things that are good for it, and get flabby. A soul can go into a sulk, fall into a stupor. Several months of winter's cold and gray can settle upon a soul like a shroud.

And then, it's time. Time to be 'roused from slumber,' as Paul says. It's time to get up and get some exercise, to renew some disciplines of the spirit, to take on some challenge which will invigorate our faith: a commitment of scripture reading? study? service? intercessory prayer, contemplative prayer?

It's time to do some housecleaning, to take a good look at the state of things within—that's what we do on Ash Wednesday, and continue through Lent. It's time to do some sorting out—what do we need to get rid of? What are we storing up that weighs us down, and keeps us from traveling lightly in the Way: grudges? resentments? misplaced priorities? What needs to be cleaned and scrubbed—some relationship? attitude? behavior?

It's time to open the windows of the soul and let some fresh gusts of the Spirit blow around in us, and blow us around, stirring up some new thoughts, pushing us in new directions, unsettling our comfortable assumptions and conditions, refreshing our fellowship with other believers.

It's time to clean out—or, more accurately, to let the Holy Spirit clean us out, so that we can walk slowly through the world, and bow often; so that when the risen Lord appears, as he surely does, we will have a spiritual room that has been prepared for him, and we will hear his knock, and answer with eager gladness, "Come in, come in!"

This year, we are ready for the Lenten season of preparation. At the church, the Lenten season has been prepared for us, and for you. Join us for Lenten exercise and cleaning—in worship, in Lenten school and Sunday school, in Lenten mission projects. It's time.

Soul Feast: Our Church Library in Focus

Book of the Kells by Bernard Meehan

Anyone who is interested in learning about the Gospels through beautiful illustrations will adore this book. This is an illustrated introduction to the real Book of Kells located at Trinity College in Ireland. Was featured in the Forum class pertaining to the history of how it was written.

Saint Patrick by Ann Tompert

This book concentrates on the man who Christianized Ireland instead of the legends surrounding his name.

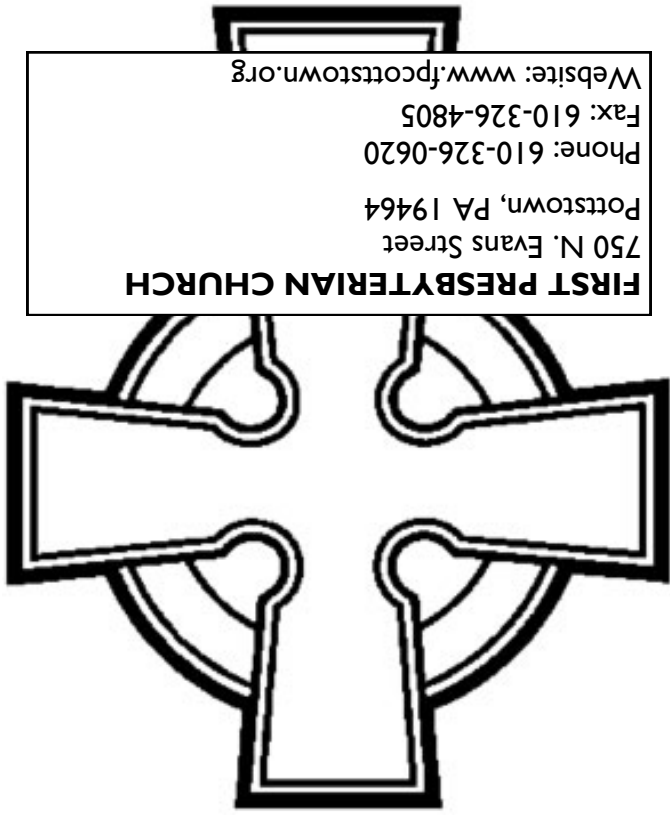
The Quiet Man (DVD)
