Letter from the Co-Pastors

There are three matters we want to bring to your attention this month. First, during the season of Lent, we will be preaching a series on “Another Way to Walk,” in which we explore the path that Jesus Christ has blazed for us that can be very different from the ways that the world wants to follow. What does it mean, for example, to try to live simply in an often cluttered world? What does it mean to live humbly in an ambitious world that often wants to compare and compete or walk the way of forgiveness in a vengeful world? We will seek to explore these questions in worship on the Sunday mornings leading up to Easter.

Lent is not only a season of worship, it can also be a good season for growth and service. We hope that you will join us on Wednesdays in Lent as we seek the “G.I.F.T.” of Growing in Faith Together. We are gratified by how many of you have already signed up, but there is still room, even if you missed the first week. Consider being part of one of the four “G.I.F.T. circles” described on p. 3—and let someone else cook dinner for you on Wednesdays! Lent also provides us a way of serving others, whether it is through the regular outreach ministries of our congregation or by participation in the Lenten “Cluster Buckets” mission collection (p. 7).

Finally, our congregation has once again received a major grant from the Mary Porter Designated fund of the Community Foundation of Broward. As you may recall from this past year, the Session has established the following guidelines for use of the grant:

- **Enhancement of current ministries, which would include any of the following:** (1) Special one-time programs, concerts, lectures, or other ministry events or expenses over and above the present ministries funded by the General Fund. (2) Grant-funded ministry such as a part-time parish nurse position), and (3) seed money for new ministries.
- **Capital Improvements to our facilities that would have one of the following purposes:** Conserve energy consumption, reduce the environmental impact of our facilities and ministries, or Increase accessibility and/or safety for members and visitors to these facilities.
- **Contributions to other ministries and non-profit organizations** that impact children and families or the quality of life of the greater Pottstown area.

If you have an idea that meets one of these criteria, let us know and will pass it on to the taskforce that will be studying the needs and making recommendations to Session later this Spring.

At all times, but especially in Lent, as we consider Christ’s sacrifice of love for our sake, may we seek the way of Christ that leads to generosity and compassion, love and service, joy and peace.

- **Forum (Community Room)**

March 1, 8, 15: Dr. Donna Yarri: “Death, Euthanasia, and the Right to Die”

Dr. Donna Yarri, Associate Professor of Theology at Alvernia University, will be teaching a three week class (March 1, March 8, and March 15) on issues related to death and dying. Some of the questions to be addressed include: What does death in the Christian context? What is meant by euthanasia, and what are the different kinds? To what extent should patients have autonomy in making their own health care decisions, including those related to death? These and other questions will be source of discussion during this class.

March 22 and 29: Dr. Steven Boyer, “The Mystery of God: Theology for Knowing the Unknowable”

Dr. Boyer, Professor of Theology at Eastern University and co-author of The Mystery of God, winner of *Christianity Today's* 2014 Book of the Year award will help us reflect on what it means to say that God is both radically incomprehensible and also genuinely revealed in Jesus Christ—and what this all means practically for our life and worship.

Topic: Will You Come and Follow Me? An Adult Lenten Study on Hymns.

Each week, we will study the text of a hymn, learn more about the hymn writers, and discuss how the text relates to us today. 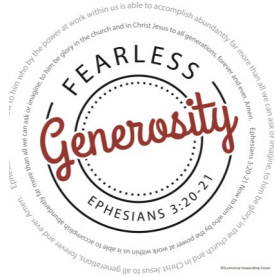

FAITH AND NATURE GROUP

March will be a busy month for our group. Because of severe wind and dangerous cold we were forced to reschedule our annual Walk in the Woods until **March 1st**. If the Celtic Cross reaches you before then, I hope you will consider taking part in this special hike in the beautiful Nolde Forest. We will leave at approximately 1:30pm, but we will wait for any families taking part in the Stockholder Luncheon. Just let me know that you want to go along.

The highlight of the season will be our trip to the Middle Creek Wildlife Area on **March 15th** to view the spectacular snow geese and tundra swan migration. Each year tens of thousands of snow geese and tundra swan stop at Middle Creek to rest and refuel on their journey back to the Arctic. The sight is spell-bounding. It is one of the most amazing migrations in the world and Middle Creek is one of only a handful of locations in North America where you can see this many birds in one spot. The magic really happens when thousands of geese and swan erupt into flight because of a perceived threat in the area, the sight and sound overwhelms the senses. This is a photographer's paradise. And, I almost forgot to mention that there are usually eagles in the vicinity. Middle Creek also offers the best opportunity to see dozens of species of ducks and waterfowl in the region. Occasionally, short eared owls are present in the late afternoon before sunset. There is a driving tour through the refuge as well, which we can do if time allows. The plan is to leave from First Pres at 1:00pm via carpool and return by approximately 6:30pm. Feel free to come and go as you please. Music Notes

Both the Cherubs and Celtic Singers are hard at work preparing for Palm Sunday and Easter. Both are also singing during Lent with the Cherubs singing March 8th, "The Lord is My Shepherd," and the Celtic Singers singing March 15th, "I Want Jesus to Walk With Me" by Hal Hopson. It should sound familiar as the Senior Choir, Bell Choir, and Deb Voytko featured it in February. Finishing the month, both choirs are singing on Palm Sunday. The Cherubs - "Sing Hosanna" by Patterson, and the Celtic Singers - "Blessed is He" again by Hal Hopson.

The Handbells will ring the prelude entitled, "Spirit of God, Descend Upon my Soul," on Sunday, March 1.st George Croly, an Anglican minister from Dublin, Ireland, wrote the original hymn. Its text is a prayer asking for God to change us -- to change us from the inside out -- to teach us how to love God as we ought to love (v. 1) -- to allow us to seek God and to find him (v. 3) -- to teach us that God is always with us (v. 4) -- and to teach us to love as the angels love (v. 5).

The Chancel Choir is preparing several Lenten masterpieces. "Surely He has Born Our Grievs," "I want Jesus to Walk with Me," "Jesus, Lover of my Soul," "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," and "Order My Steps" will be heard during Sunday worship services in March. The Ash Wednesday, Wholeness and Maundy Thursday services will feature the choir, soloists, quartets, and instrumentalists performing pieces from our new hymnal "Glory To God."

Two haunting pieces you'll hear coming from the pipes this month are Albinoni's "Adagio in G Minor" and Edward Elgar's "Largo." The Adagio has been used many times in pop culture, such as in films like "Dragonslayer" and "Flashdance", funeral music in "The Sopranos", and recorded by The Doors and Il Divo! Since most of us have HAD IT with winter, you may be glad to hear J.S. Bach's "Awake, Thou Wintry Earth." And what's a month without a little Mark Hayes on the piano? This month you'll recognize his interpretations of "Lord of the Dance" and "Be Not Afraid."

Library News—*Brief Impressions*

Beneath an enlarged photo of a caterpillar on a green twig is the following observation: “What the caterpillar calls the end of the world, the Master calls a butterfly.” *Brief Impressions*, a photo album nearly 12 by 11 inches in size, is a collection of eye-catching photographs, rich with color—images of a variety of animals and birds, sunrises and shimmering sunsets, fireworks, bucolic lakes, flowers and trees—nature at its best. And amusing signs along the country roads the photographer and her husband traveled. Quotations by well-known persons from around the world accompany the photos, occasionally adding a spiritual quality to them.

But for a collision between two cars in rural Ft. Myers, FL more than a decade ago, this volume of extraordinary images, taken in Michigan and Florida, probably never would have been created. The couple—Laura and Kevin Lavrack, he a community college professor at the time—would have found other activities to occupy their time. However, their days were not to be ordinary. Rather, because he was seriously injured in an auto accident, they were fraught with ongoing medical issues, which required, discovering new meaning in everyday life. Several years following the auto mishap, Laurie began to take and accumulate thousands of images of dozens of subjects in the countryside, seashore and many places in between. The photo album enabled them to express themselves with photos and words of wisdom, comfort and humor. Sitting in his wheelchair in front of a computer, Kevin spent hours on the internet researching appropriate messages to accompany Laurie’s photos. The blending of words and images produces inspiring perceptions of nature and man. Beneath the picture of an old brown boot is the following: “When you have worn out your shoes, the strength of the shoe leather has passed into the fiber of your body. I measure your health by the number of shoes and hats and clothes you have worn out.”—*Ralph Waldo Emerson*.

For a refreshing perspective on some of God’s creatures, water scenes and foliage in all its glory, *Brief Impressions* offers a pictorial commentary rarely seen before.

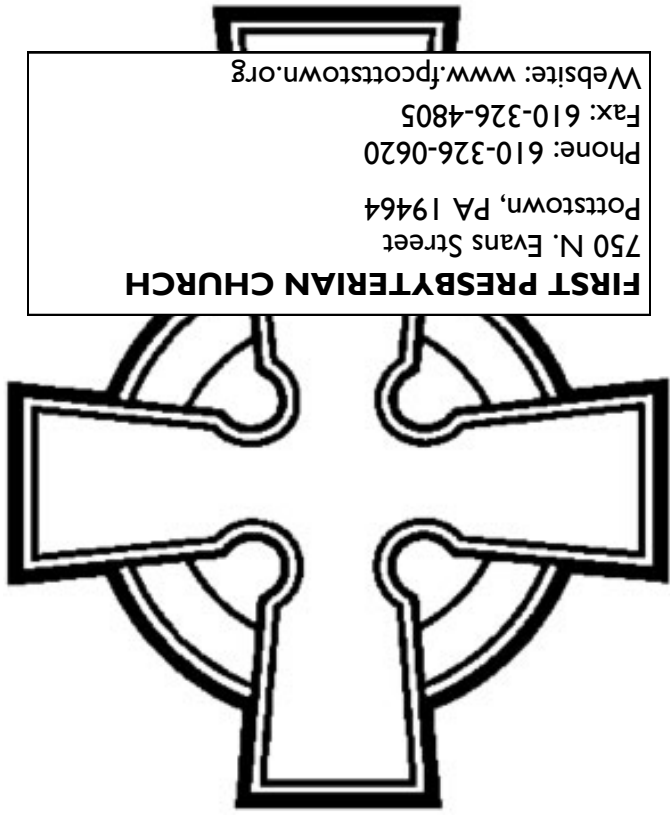
