Letter from the Co-Pastors:

'Tis the season for fertilizing, seeding, and mowing. Someone passed this imaginary conversation on to us which we thought you might find amusing—and provocative:

God: “Frank, you know all about gardens and nature. What in the world is going on down there on the planet? What happened to the dandelions, violets, milkweeds and stuff I started eons ago? I had a perfect no-maintenance garden plan. Those plants grow in any type of soil, withstand drought and multiply with abandon. I expected to see a vast garden of colors by now. But, all I see are those green rectangles.”

St. Francis: “It’s the tribes that settled there—the Suburbanites. They started calling your flowers ‘weeds’ and now kill them and replace them with grass.”

God: “Grass? But it’s so boring. It’s not colorful. It doesn’t attract butterflies, birds and bees; only grubs and sod worms. It’s sensitive to temperatures. Do these Suburbanites really want all that grass growing there?”

St. Francis: “Apparently so, Lord. They begin each spring by fertilizing grass and poisoning any other plant that crops up in the lawn.”

God: “The spring rains and warm weather probably makes grass grow really fast. That must make the Suburbanites happy.”

St. Francis: “They cut down trees and grind them up to make the mulch.....”

What other human activities are we so serious about that from a divine perspective might look at least a little silly? Where do we need to step back and, with a sense of humor, look at our lives from a little different perspective?

Library in Focus

Here are two new resources for couples, singles, and parents:

The Five Love Languages DVD (one hour)

This DVD shares in a one-hour format the subject of the discussion led by Carter and Kerry during Lent: the “Five Love Languages.” Dr. Gary Chapman, a marriage and relationship counselor for 35 years, has identified five “love languages” or fundamental ways to express love. His point is that we often love in the way that we want most to be loved – but not necessarily in the way that our spouse or other loved one needs and wants to be loved. When that happens, Chapman contends, communication breaks down and couples can feel like something is missing. Most people in the Lenten seminar found the Chapman’s points both humorous and helpful. Check it out and see if what he offers makes a difference in your most important relationships.

The Five Love Languages of Children by Gary Chapman and Ross Campbell (book)

How do we best love our children, taking into account their particular temperaments and traits? In this helpful book, Dr. Chapman, a nationally known marriage counselor, and Dr. Campbell, an associate professor of pediatrics and psychiatry, offer some good tools for every parent to use – no matter how old our children are.
