Letter from the Co-Pastors:

*Arise my love...and come away; for now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone.
The flowers appear on the earth; the time of singing has come..."*
(Song of Solomon 2:12)

It's May! What better month to talk about flowers, specifically, flowers in the sanctuary? In the Christian tradition, the practice of bringing flowers into the sanctuary dates back to the 4th century when monasteries grew flowers for decoration of the church. Imagine how the flowers of the field brightened those cold, dark, windowless spaces, as worshippers brought jewels of creation from the outside, in!

But sanctuary flowers are more than decoration. Sanctuary flowers are also *love gifts*. Remember when you were in love and gave flowers to One you love? Flowers in the sanctuary are ways of saying "I love you" to God, whom we come to be with and adore in worship. That's why the flower dedication always begins "given to the glory of God..."

But sanctuary flowers are more than love gifts. They are also *a symbol*, something that points beyond itself to something or someone unseen. Sanctuary flowers point to the One who created all things. Though "no human eye can look upon God and live," we can gaze in wonder at the handiwork of God in creation, and think about the Creator: what better place to do that than in the sanctuary of the Lord?

But sanctuary flowers are more than a symbol of the Creator. They are also an *affirmation of faith* in the abundant life, the resurrection life, we are given in Christ. In every season, even in the cold and dark of winter, even in the grief and sorrow of death at funerals, sanctuary flowers hold forth the beauty and delight of life with God. They declare with the psalmist, "You show me the path of life. In your presence there is fullness of joy; in your right hand are pleasures forevermore." (16:11)

But sanctuary flowers are more than an affirmation of faith. They are also an *exhortation* to all who look upon them to "Consider the lilies of the field...do not worry about your life...Your heavenly Father knows what you need. Seek first the kingdom of God and God's righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you." (Matthew 6: 25-33) Sanctuary flowers are an exhortation, and an *assurance* of God's providential care.

This month: The Friends of Los Ninos

Several years ago I had the opportunity to meet Claude Wilson in San Diego, and to travel with him to an orphanage for abandoned children in Tijuana, Mexico. My eyes were opened to the great need there, and to the dedication that Claude and his loyal group of volunteers have to these children. Today this ministry continues as the "Friends of Los Ninos" provides support to several orphanages in the Tijuana area. The Friends of Los Ninos is a non-profit corporation of volunteers that understand their mission to be the care and nurture of orphaned, abandoned, and sick children in Mexico. Their mission also states that "Therefore, we as Christians have a duty to provide shelter, nourishment, education, and physical and social development within a loving environment". First Presbyterian's mission donations to the Friends of Los Ninos is used "dollar for dollar" to purchase food, supplies, and medicine in Tijuana to distribute to local orphanages.

The question that is often asked of Claude is: Why do you go on doing this? He answers: "We are a small number of volunteers who devote countless hours of time, energy, and money to this mission. The answer is neither simple or rational. But I am enabled by others who are involved in similar ministries. Are they often frustrated? Yes. But they continue on. Our answer is basically: **Because there are so many children who need help.**" Your contributions to the church enable us to support this vital ministry.

Session Digest

At its April meeting, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns.
- Joyfully heard the statements of faith of new Deacons, Tim Peckham, Bill Wilson, Abi Rose-Craver and Scott Geyer, and heard what they learned during officer training. The Session unanimously approved their “examination.” The Session then appointed a commission to meet with new Deacon Cindy Collins since she was out of town. All Deacons and Elders will be ordained and/or installed April 29.
- Approved the celebration of the Lord’s Supper on the Confirmation retreat.
- Approved the choir from Westminster Presbyterian Church in Grand Rapids, Michigan to sing in worship on July 1. They will be staying in our church that Saturday as part of a youth choir tour.
- Heard that the Session minutes were approved by Presbytery without exception. Well done Clerk of Session, Ron Gower!
- No monthly financial reports were yet available as the fourth week of receipts had not been finalized. Reports will be distributed to Session members as soon as available and monthly allocations for capital improvement and mission for two months will be made at May’s Session meeting.
- Approved another invitation being extended to church members to purchase a “Sing the Faith” songbook in honor or memory of someone in time for Mother’s Day. The Worship Committee hopes to add 40-50 more songbooks.
- Approved the expenditure up to \$14,000 from the Capital Improvement fund for stucco replacement on the dormers and approved the expenditure of up to \$4000 for steeple repointing and miscellaneous concrete work.
- Approved the recommendation by the Endowment Committee concerning the maximum level of alternative investments permitted by the church’s portfolio manager, Glenmede.
- Heard a report of an upcoming Acorns of Faith luncheon and received the reports of Deacons and the Administrative, Fun and Fellowship, Hospitality, Mission, Spiritual Formation, and Worship committees.
- Gave guidance to a taskforce that will write up Session by-laws as called for in the new Book of Order.
- Approved for a Rebuilding Together Pottstown exploration group to meet monthly at the church.
- Expressed gratitude for those Elders rotating off Session: Gina James, Paul Lepard, and Scott Sample.
- Prayer requests by the Committees: For the confirmation retreat; thanksgiving for Karen Keiser’s service as coordinator of our tutoring/mentoring program at Barth Elementary, for new outreach ideas for Hospitality, for upcoming fellowship events to strengthen our church family ties; for major building projects to be completed; for Peggy on Administrative Assistant Day, and for the elders rotating off Session.

"HOW DO FLOWERS GET INTO THE SANCTUARY?"

First, find a date. Peggy Cressman, our church secretary, maintains a Flower Calendar. Give her a call and talk about open dates. Or, periodically the Flower Calendar will appear in the lobby on Sunday mornings. When it does, pick a date and sign up. We'll follow up.

Second, find some flowers. If you, like the monks, grow flowers, you can arrange your flowers in the church's plastic liner cups and bring in the work of your hands. Or, if you would like to order flowers from a local florist, you will find a list of recommended florists with contact information in the literature racks, or in the church office. Or, if you would like to make a contribution of any amount to the Deacons' Assistance Fund, you can ask the church office to put our silk arrangements in the sanctuary for worship. (Checks are payable to the Deacons' Assistance Fund.)

Third, find the words you want to use to dedicate the flowers. The flowers are given to God, so dedications generally begin with something like "given to the glory of God..." Sometimes the gift of flowers is prompted by thanksgiving for a special occasion or person, or a profound spiritual experience, and so the dedication might continue with words like "with thanksgiving for..." or "in memory of..." or "in honor of..." When finding your words, remember these are *God's* love gift, meant to give glory to God and not to ourselves.

IDEA #1

Have a family dinner ritual– It could look something like this!

(Remember to include the children in each aspect. They learn by hearing, seeing *and* doing!)

Light a candle

Take turns reading a piece of scripture– psalms are a great place to start! (Fit the length of the passage to the age of your children)

Share your joys and concerns from the day– pray for each other after you have shared them. Ask God to be with you in your highs and your lows.


Deacons’ Bench: News from the Cluster
