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Dearly Beloved,

Recently we have been apartment hunting in Philadelphia with one of our daughters. Walking the sidewalks and peering out the back windows of the Washington Square neighborhood, we have been reminded of when we moved into our first home, a Baltimore “rowhome” in the Charles Village section of that city. In that neighborhood, four rows of iconic brick homes formed the perimeter of a square city block. Out our back window were the postage stamp yards, fences, alleys and garages that filled in the square made by the four brick rows (picture a scene from Hitchcock’s “Rear Window”).

Our parents looked out on the scene and shuddered, seeing mainly the cracks in the old buildings, the weeds in the pavement, the police helicopters overhead. But when we looked out on our backyard, we saw Carter’s first garden, neighbors talking over the fence, uprooted sidewalks (which meant mature leafy trees grew there!), Eddie’s deli around the corner, and Memorial stadium several blocks away. True, you probably had to live in the neighborhood to appreciate its delights. But even if you lived there, it was possible to miss them. You had to look closely, with eyes and heart wide open, to see the blessings in our backyard.

Photographer Freeman Patterson says “If you do not see what is around you every day, what will you see when you go to Tangiers?” This is the time of year when many of us start hitting the road to go elsewhere — the shore, the mountains, maybe even exotic places like Tangiers. And if we can travel, rejoice!

But as we go and come, it wouldn’t hurt to look again, and closely, at the scene out our own windows. What delights have our eyes looked upon so often we have become blind to them? What marvels have been performed so regularly for us that we have come to regard them as ordinary and routine? If we hope to see the wonder and marvels of this great world in which we are lucky to be alive, we will learn to see by focusing on things around us every day. There are beauty and blessings in our own backyard.

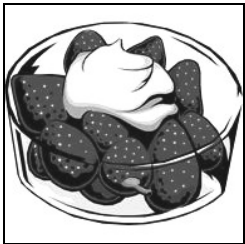

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## **Salt and Light**

**A monthly look behind the scenes at the mission and ministry of FPC**

**This month: John Gloucester House**

The Mission Committee supports several agencies in the Philadelphia area, one of them being the John Gloucester House. JGH was established in 1968 in the Point Breeze section of Philadelphia, and was named after Reverend John Gloucester, the first African-American Presbyterian pastor in Philadelphia. JGH is a faith-based organization of the Presbyterian Community Ministries of the Delaware Valley, and was funded for many years through the Philadelphia Presbytery. This important ministry is now “independent”, and continues to need funding from individual churches. The programs offered include after school tutoring, cultural arts, summer day camp, Vacation Bible School, life skills preparation, guidance counseling for college bound students, SAT preparation, and adult bible study. Our church has been a faithful participant for many years in supporting this ministry through our mission budget.

## **Faith and Nature: A New Perspective**

Spring is here. Usually, I am like a kid on Christmas Eve this time of year. Spring migration from mid-April through the end of May is the highlight of every birder's year. Every year I would make sure to take a week off from work just to travel around the region to as many birding hotspots as possible. How many species of warblers could I find? Any glimpses of that first hummingbird or oriole? Are there any young eagles teetering on the edge of their nest; ready to test the wings God has blessed them with?

I am still like a kid this year, but one who has to watch the world go by from my back porch. After injuring my knee on Easter, I will not be hiking and traveling this Spring. But looking out on my backyard, I realize that I am still quite blessed. I have spent the last few years making our yard into a backyard habitat, and it has paid off abundantly. From here, I can watch the bluebirds arrive and make a home in the boxes on our fence. I can wait and see exactly when the first chipping sparrow, tree swallows, and orioles arrive. I also have a front row seat to the arrival of the first hummingbird. I watch as the chickadees and tufted titmouse take nesting materials from the suet cages we have filled with an assortment of dog hair, string, and yarn. Every day I watch new buds emerge and flowers bloom. I listen and hear all the varieties of bird song and calls.

I have always wanted to have more time to enjoy our yard and the work that we have put into it, but I was always too busy doing something else. Many of us these days are too busy running here and there, looking ahead to the next thing on our "to-do" lists. Wishing we had the time or resources to make our lives "perfect." But the reality is, if we take just a little time out of our frantic pursuit of all these things and pause for a few minutes to really look at what we have in our own backyards and homes, most of us will realize how truly blessed we are. Just think about it, if you pay attention, you can see the miracle of life play out before your eyes. Whether it is planting a garden and watching it come to fruition or watching as birds court with one another, lay eggs, and bring their young into the feeders to start the circle of life all over again. If you have a hummingbird feeder, think about the wondrous miracle of how a tiny bird can travel 3000 miles or more to arrive and spend the summer and fall in your backyard and then make the same journey back again year after year.

We are blessed... it's just a matter of perspective.

"Hummingbird dart lightly through the world, spreading it's joy of beauty and wonder, and teaching us to appreciate the wonder and magic of everyday existence. Hummingbird brings the gift of joy. Learn to laugh and be happy." At its April meeting, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns.
- Joyfully heard the statements of faith of new Deacons, David DeLong, Kathleen Moyer, Marianne Harrison, Beth Ann Straub, Lisa Livezey, April Thorum, Caroline Stacks, Connor Ferreri, and new Elder Bill Dupree, and heard what they learned during officer training. The Session unanimously approved their “examination.” All Deacons and Elders will be ordained and/or installed April 28.
- Approved the celebration of the Lord’s Supper on the Adult Mission trip, should the Lord’s Supper be celebrated in worship.
- Approved the baptism of Ryan Timothy Detweiler, child of God and son of Marguerite and Tim Detweiler, on July 21, 2013.
- Approved the recommendation of the Communications/Social Media team that once a church Facebook page is established that church members be offered an “opt-out” option if they do not wish that their pictures, or pictures of their children, would be posted on the church page.
- Received with gratitude a gift to the church from Lu and Jim Gaut.
- Heard an update from the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee that the Church Information Form has been approved by Presbytery and is ready to be posted on the national website and approved the minimum and maximum salary for the position.
- Received the monthly financial report and approved the monthly mission and Capital Improvement allocations.
- Approved the expenditure up to \$35,000 from the Capital Improvement fund to replace the boiler this summer. The current boiler model is out of production and parts are increasingly difficult to obtain for repairs. A new boiler will result in significant energy savings.
- Approved receipt of the Pentecost offering.
- Received the reports of Deacons and the Administrative, Endowment, Fun and Fellowship, Hospitality, Mission, Spiritual Formation, and Worship committees.
- Prayer requests by the Committees: Thanksgiving that we have the resources to replace the boiler without a special appeal to the congregation; for our new Inquirers’ Class; thanksgiving for the Kenya clothing donations and for the Cluster; thanksgiving for the many volunteers involved in the Spiritual Formation program and for the Senior High Seekers retreat; for our adult mission trip; thanksgiving for those involved in the Progressive Dinner and for our fellowship opportunities; for our worship volunteers; and for guidance for our Endowment and Associate Pastor Nominating committees.

It was then sent to the Presbytery. We received notification that it had been received and was being “sent to a team for approval” with this final comment: “No need to worry, your CIF is outstanding.” Soon after that, we received this note: “Great news, your CIF has been approved.” We were all delighted with this news as many hours had been spent in the preparation of our CIF.

Next, Bill Campbell, our Moderator, will enter the CIF online through our national denominational Church Leadership Connection. Their staff will review it and it will appear in the “Opportunity Search” of the General Assembly’s website for interested candidates to review and respond. Our APNC will receive additional training in preparation for the next step, reviewing incoming applications (PIFs). This training is scheduled for early May, tentatively for May 5<sup>th</sup>.
