Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dearly Beloved,

Don't you love this time of year? In a matter of days it seems, the brown ground turns green, and then a little later, bare trees suddenly are clothed with leaves. Forsythia and daffodils, redbuds and dogwoods bring yellows and pinks that were missing from the winter palette of colors. Another season goes and another season comes. While we each probably have our favorite seasons, don't we Mid-Atlantic residents also appreciate living in a four-season climate (even if we like our winters shorter and a bit warmer than this last one)?

In the same way, we each live through seasons in our lives: seasons of dependence on others and seasons of independence; seasons of schooling and seasons of putting that education to work; seasons of discovering others and seasons of discovering ourselves; seasons of adding to what we have and seasons of letting go; seasons of feeling stressed by having too much to do and seasons of stress for not having enough to do; seasons of saying hello and finding our way as the new ones on the block and seasons of savoring family and community and saying good-bye. And, just as in nature, the seasons overlap and come and go, only to be repeated with variations.

Throughout the seasons of life, we seek health and wholeness for ourselves and for our loved ones. We are excited that, thanks to the Porter fund of the Broward Foundation, we have been able to join those congregations who have added a parish nurse position to our ministry team. As you will see, your responses can be anonymous, or include your name, which will help with follow-up where needed.

There are also seasons to our spiritual lives: seasons when we feel close to God and seasons when God seems distant, seasons when all seems certain and black and white, and seasons when we are overwhelmed by mystery and uncertainty. But while we change and our experience of God changes, God does not change. God is ever faithful, ever true, ever loving. No matter what season we are in, may we seek the God who has already found us, and may we remember that sometimes it takes several seasons for a tree to grow into maturity and bear fruit.

Family Faith Formation

We all know that it takes a village to raise a kid, that there's strength in numbers and all sorts of other clichés that exist in our cultural lexicon, but sometimes it's helpful to remember these clichés endure for good reason. The Fuller Youth Institute has identified some of the keys to a 'sticky faith' that lasts into adulthood. One key is "The more students serve and build relationships with younger children, the more likely it is that their faith will stick." This relationship cuts two ways. When the high school youth build relationships with young children, the young children build relationships with the teenagers. These relationships build a lifelong understanding that the body of Christ is not just adults and children, but that it exists for people of all ages; children, adolescents, older adults, young adults.

Sticky faith is a faith that is built through relationships. You can learn all of the facts about the Bible that you want, and you can read stories until you are blue in the face, but one of the most important things for kids is that they know that the Bible is still living in our community today. When they hear the stories and see their church family living out the stories from their Sunday school they know how important the stories really are.

Find people in our community to live the Bible with. Invite people you see at church into the life of your family. When they grow up knowing that they are cared for by so many people they learn that they are cared for by God!

Music Notes

The Chancel Handbells will ring in Communion Sunday with the African-American spiritual, "I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me" with "Lord, I Want to be a Christian" arranged by Sondra K. Tucker. Mrs. Tucker is the founding director of the Pyramid Ringers of Memphis and is currently on the music staff at Chapelwood United Methodist Church in Houston, Texas. She is an accomplished flutist and enjoys composing for flute and organ in addition to her work writing for and conducting handbells.

We will hear a variety of musical offerings from throughout the centuries at the keyboards this month. There will be an offertory written by 17th century Dieterich Buxtehude (a fun name to pronounce!), a couple of Bach chorales, and a few English organ voluntaries from the 18th century, and several contemporary pieces by favorites, Joseph M. Martin, Mark Hayes, and Joel Raney. Some tunes you will recognize include: "Amazing Grace," the tender "My Shepherd Will Supply My Need" from Southern Harmony, "On Eagle's Wings," "Make Me a Channel of Your Peace," "Give Me Jesus" and a Pentecost medley which incorporates "Every Time I Feel the Spirit," "Spirit of God, Descend Upon My Heart" and "Breathe on Me, Breath of God."

The Chancel Choir will bring several spirituals to the worship service this spring including "Take Me To The Water" arranged by Rollo Dillworth. This contemporary gospel style piece incorporates quotes from two African-American spirituals: "Down by the Riverside" and "Wade in the Water". Throughout the period of slavery many of these religious folk melodies were composed and passed on by oral tradition and the subject of water became a common theme. Not only was water viewed as a means of spiritual cleansing and purification but it also served as a means of covering the scent of an escaping slave. Hence, slaves would often make references to water images in their songs in the hope that they would become free.

Joel Raney's arrangement of "Standin' in the Need of Prayer" will also be sung this month, along with Josephine Poelinitz's "City Called Heaven." Like many spirituals, the origins of these pieces are unknown but the tune and text became popular after their publication in *The Book of American Negro Spirituals* (1925) by James Weldon Johnson.

This Mother's Day both children's choirs will be singing "Feed My Lambs" by Dori Erwin Collins. Its lovely melody will stay with you all day.

Our music ministry continues to devote and dedicate ourselves to present our best musical works before God. We hope and pray that we may inspire and encourage you through our musical selections.

At its April meeting, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns.
- Joyfully heard the statements of faith of new Elders Sharon Holloway and Andy Lane and Deacon Laura Hazeltine and heard what they learned during officer training. The Session unanimously approved their “examination.” The Session also met with Lorraine Estell, who served as a Deacon in two previous churches and therefore did not need to be examined.
- The Session approved a commission to meet separately with and examine Shane Dugan, who could not be present at the Session meeting. The Session learned that Kayla Hofmann has determined that she will not be able to serve as a Deacon.
- Approved the celebration of the Lord’s Supper on the Adult Mission trip in Bayville, N.J.
- Approved Carter taking leave on May 8-10 to visit his mother.
- Approved the transfer of Connie Reitmeyer to First Presbyterian Church, Wildwood, Florida.
- Approved receipt of the Pentecost offering.
- Heard from the Mission Committee that our congregation donated at least 47 filled buckets to the Pottstown Cluster in support of the Your Way Home program.
- Received a report from the Mission Committee that Kerry, Tom Zeigler, and Barbara Longstreth had met with the new executive director of Habitat for Humanity of Montgomery County and learned that Habitat plans to begin work on a house in Pottstown in June. Habitat also plans to begin working on existing houses as a neighborhood initiative.
- Received the monthly financial report and approved transfer of one month’s mission allocation to the General Fund.
- Received reports from those committees who met in April: Hospitality, Mission, Spiritual Formation, and Endowment.
- Prayer requests by the Committees:
 - Mission: Thanksgiving for those volunteering to go on adult mission trip.
 - Spiritual Formation: Thanksgiving for our teachers and volunteers and prayers for people to continue to step up to offer childcare for our youngest children.
 - Worship: Joyful gratitude for our music ministry.
 - Hospitality: Thanksgiving for our visitors and prayers that they will want to make FPC their church home.

Library Notes—A Review of *Enough for Today*

Enough for Today takes the reader on a journey he or she will never forget: “My eyes did not see God the night my 16-year old son (Robbie) dove into a friend’s pool and broke his neck,” writes Sue Wunder. The author’s story is a heart-wrenching, though inspirational, account of a New Jersey mother whose teenaged son dealt with, and recovered from, being paralyzed from the chest down. The 2006 event changed Wunder’s life forever, and the book chronicles her thoughts and actions in dealing with that new reality.

Enough for Today also describes how Robbie’s friends and fellow classmates offered their compassion and support. Wunder’s account is sprinkled liberally with Bible verses that saw her and her family through challenges that would crush many of us. Titles of chapters also reflect her belief in God’s powers to heal: “We Walk by Faith,” “He Provides,” “Trusting God,” “The Gift of People,” “Listening and Praise,” “Choose to See Beauty,” “Salvaging After Loss.”

“The way our community has gathered in my family’s behalf is a prime example of what matters,” she wrote in her daily journal. “Life is about our travel companions and, when we leave here, we leave everything below the roof down on the street and take along everything that grew in us from others. So, because of the people in my life, I feel very wealthy.” The book’s opening paragraph also sums up the author’s over-arching message about Robbie’s tragic accident and subsequent recovery: “It was my faith in Him who has given me His word that He will never leave me. Yes, God was there, waiting for me to come running.”


