Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dearly Beloved:

On November 10, we officially embark on a new chapter in the journey of this 165 year-old congregation: our new Associate Pastor will join us. We hope that you all can join us that Sunday! During the Sunday School hour, Jeff and Carrie, his wife of about a week by then, will share something about their families, journeys to this point, and their different calls to ministry (by the way, like a number of younger couples they will both hyphenate their names: Fox-Kline). Then, Jeff will be introduced during worship, and Jeff and Carrie will be welcomed at a reception that follows. He will then jump into ministry with both feet: going off on a retreat with Kerry and the senior high Seekers and advisors the very next weekend.

As Jeff comes on board, we want to take the chance to thank all of those Sunday School teachers, youth advisors, Spiritual Formation Committee members, Young Children and Worship volunteers, and other parents, who worked with Kerry and me during the year to fill in as needed without a staff person on board for children and youth ministry. In hindsight, it seems like our decision not to try to hire an interim person was a good one. It would have been hard for our children and youth to have to say good-bye again to someone after only a year. We have been able to continue the strong ministry to children and youth that this congregation is known for only because of dedicated volunteers who have gone the extra mile. It would have been hard for all of us to sustain that extraordinary commitment much longer without more staff help, so Jeff's arrival is well-timed. Please take the time to thank all of the volunteers working with our children and youth.

We are excited to have Jeff as a colleague: in a multigenerational church it helps to have a multigenerational staff! And it is fitting that Jeff will begin on November 10 when we dedicate our commitments of money, time, and talents for the new year. His position is a symbol of the investment we are making for the present and future of God's ministry here at First Presbyterian Church, just as past generations have made such investments from which we benefit. And unlike the investments we might make in other places, our investment in the church and in God's causes is one that never fails to deliver a positive return: *"The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully."* (2 Corinthians 9:6)

Once again this year, may we count our blessings and invest our treasure, time, and talents with God with joyful hearts!



October 14th was a classic Indian summer day. Along for the hike were: Bill Dupree, Hank and Dee Phillips, Susan Matrone, Sue Moyer and her two grandchildren, Andrew and Brandon. I always am grateful when new faces show up for our outings as we all get to share the wonders of nature together while forging new friendships with fellow members of our church. This trip was certainly no exception as conversations flowed all along the trail from beginning to end. Early on, the trail to our first stop at The Pulpit was crowded. But we made good time and I was quietly impressed with the pace our group kept. From there we made the trek to the Pinnacle and the grandkids led the way. The forest around us was quiet, and I found myself just listening to the breeze and the occasional chips and trills of chickadees. But I also was thinking how wonderful it was that we were following two kids ages 11 and 13 on this challenging trail. When we finally arrived at the top, the vista before us produced a sense of quiet awe amongst our group as we all paused to eat our lunches and just take it all in. There is something about being up high enough that you can look down on soaring birds of prey that just makes your soul feel alive.

I asked some of my fellow hikers if they wished to share any of their reflections from this hike and was simply humbled by what Sue Matrone wrote as it sums up what this group is all about: *"With the two year anniversary of my Mother's death approaching and the pressures of my job situation, I haven't been sleeping well. Therefore, I wasn't sure if I was up to the 10 mile hike to the Pinnacle. However, once our small church group started on the hike and conversations started flowing, I knew that it was going to be a great day. It wasn't just a great day, it was an amazing day! We were blessed with perfect weather and eating my peanut butter sandwich at the Pinnacle was heaven to me. I wish it would have been a little less crowded at the Pinnacle but it didn't stop me from finding the peace I was searching for with all that's been on my mind. I looked out at the amazing landscape and thought, thank you Lord - I needed that. I also needed the conversations that flowed from work situations, to dealing with cancer and other personal situations. My reflections - we are truly blessed with such beauty all around us and it's very easy to just wallow in self pity and fall into darkness. But when you feel the pull, go and the Lord will provide you with exactly what you need - spiritual growth".*

I also feel truly blessed. God through nature's wonders heals and rejuvenates us. Amen.

At its October meetings, the Session:

- Shared joys and concerns.
- Reviewed what we said last year this time about “what God is calling us to accomplish in the next year or two?” and reviewed under each ministry goal what has in fact been accomplished.
- Approved celebration of the Lord’s Supper on the Senior High Seekers Beach Retreat on November 17, 2013.
- Elected Bill Dupree as the second active elder serving on the Nominating Committee.
- Heard the final report of the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee, approved that all of Jeff’s moving expenses be paid from money saved in the Personnel budget because the position was not filled as early as budgeted, and thanked the Committee for its service.
- Received a report from the pastors about feedback concerning various options for Easter worship services. The feedback was obtained from congregational survey forms and a meeting that included pastors, music staff, Worship Committee chair, Spiritual Formation chair, adult choir members, Deacon moderator, Young Children and Worship representatives, parents of children’s choir members, and our sound technician. The Session discussed the report but took no action. The discussion will continue next month.
- Received the Treasurer’s Report and approved allocations to the Mission and Capital Improvement funds.
- Received a report from the Admin. Committee that the boiler work is complete and that our handbells have been refinished.
- Heard reports also from the Fun and Fellowship, Mission, Worship, Spiritual Formation, Endowment, Hospitality, and Stewardship Committees and Deacons.
- Please keep in your prayers the following:

Administrative: thanksgiving for the resources to replace the boiler.

Fellowship: for growing participation in the fellowship events.

Nominating: for wisdom and discernment on the part of the committee and those asked to serve.

Stewardship: that people will respond to the opportunity for church members to grow deeper in Christ and reach farther in love.

Spiritual Formation: for a smooth transition for our new Associate Pastor.

Worship: for joyful worship and for wisdom concerning Easter service options.

Hospitality: for new ways to provide hospitality, and for those joining the church in our next Inquirers’ Class;

APNC: for Jeff and Carrie’s move and transition.

Mission: for a safe trip for our Honduras mission trip “scouts” in November.

Kitchen Korner—Why Do We Have So Many Rules?

In our everyday life we all have rules to follow. But to some it may seem a little excessive with our requests for the use of the kitchen in our church. Some realize, others may not, that we are visited a few times a year by the Montgomery County Health Department. We may not always be happy with what we consider little picky concerns on the inspector's report, but really we should be pleased that for us who live in Montgomery County, we are in one of the most diligent counties in the state of Pennsylvania. That means that our local restaurants, schools, etc. are checked just as strictly as our church is. The Health Department requires that someone from the church attend Servsafe classes to be certified as a Foodservice Sanitation Manger. For many years now that person has been me. And so I have learned about foodborne-illness, some unpleasant things that happen with our food and places that it comes from, but I have also received great knowledge to help me be a safer cook in my own home.

About 2 years ago I provided a kitchen cleaning checklist to be used by Community Meals and others using the kitchen. It is supposed to be a final check that things are left in order. We are going to try again to encourage the use of this list. It is located in the drawer in the butcher block cabinet. I ask that the person in charge of an event or meal to please check off the list and then place in the brown envelope provided so we know that things were left in proper order after the kitchen use. On our last inspection we were written up for our range hood being dusty. Such a simple thing that could have been taken care of. Often I am sure as you wait for the pot to boil or people to arrive for an event there is some down time. I certainly don't suggest that you do major cleaning, but take a look around, straighten a drawer, remove crumbs, tidy up; and most importantly leave the kitchen as you would leave your own.


