Letter from the Co-Pastors

The rise of ISIS in Syria and Iraq, the devastation caused by ebola in Africa and the first appearance of cases here in the United States, a suddenly falling stock market—there have been times this Fall when fear among Americans has been palpable. In such times, the theme chosen by the Stewardship Committee this year, "Fearless Generosity" is either particularly timely and helpful—or particularly misplaced and inappropriate.

We vote for the first option. Why? Because the opposite of faith is not doubt; it is fear. When we are fearful, we are showing a loss of confidence and trust in God's promise to provide what we need, no matter what. Fear also robs us of our ability to love, because when we are fearful, we huddle with clenched fists to hold on to what we have, rather than reaching out and risking ourselves with open hands. Perhaps that is why "Fear not!" is such a common phrase in the Bible. And perhaps that is why Jesus makes sure to tell his disciples: "Do not fear for I have conquered the world."

How can we combat fear in our lives when it raises its ugly head and robs us of peace, hope, and love?

- Worshipping regularly. When we focus on who God is and what God is like as revealed in Jesus Christ, we are reminded that God is greater than anything we might fear. And when we gather with God's people, we are reminded that we are not alone, but have companions with whom to share our burdens and fears—and joys.
- Praying regularly. As Paul tells the Philippians, "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hears and your minds in Christ Jesus."
- Give thanks regularly. In naming our blessings and in being reminded of what God has already done in the past, we can be more confident of what God can do in the future.
- Give regularly of our money and time. God's gifts to us make us givers to others, and in our giving, we grow in our recognition of our blessings and our reliance on God. "No gift ever made any man or woman the poorer." Indeed, the more we give, the richer we feel.

Fearless generosity—it is the example set for us by God in Jesus Christ. Fearless generosity—there is no better way for us to rob fear of its power over our lives. May we all, with God's help, learn to live with fearless generosity not just when we dedicate our gifts on November 9—but throughout the year!

- Heard that Carter will be serving on the Transition Team (with Tim Peckham) for the merger

Kitchen Corner—Cross Contamination

One of the biggest reasons that we get sick from the food that we eat is cross contamination. This occurs when pathogens are transferred from one surface or food to another. Cross contamination can cause a food-born illness in many ways: contaminated ingredients are added to food that receives no further cooking; ready-to-eat food touches contaminated surfaces; contaminated food touches or drips fluid onto cooked or ready-to-eat food; a food handler touches contaminated food and then touches ready-to-eat food; or contaminated cleaning towels touch food-contact surfaces. Next month we will discuss more specific examples of cross contamination.

Poinsettia Orders


