## Letter from the Co-Pastors

Dearly Beloved,

We recently visited Sara Winterstein who, along with Flossie Schumacher, is one of our two 101 year-old members. Sara had been hospitalized with pneumonia. Her greatest concern? That she might feel better soon so that she could be at church for the congregational meeting and then to attend the service for ordination in October. As she said from her hospital bed: "This is an exciting time at our church, and I don't want to miss anything!"

Amen! This is an exciting time in our church. On October 3, our associate pastor candidate, Jeff Kline, will preach and be examined on his faith and theology on the floor of Presbytery. Assuming a positive vote (which we certainly do!) he will join us on Sunday, November 10. We will recognize him in worship and there will be a welcoming reception for him and his new wife, Carrie, following worship. We will be so excited to have Jeff on board as a colleague in ministry. And let us say again how grateful we are for all of those volunteers who have stepped up to take up more responsibilities during this interim without a staff person in place for our children and youth ministries.

Even as we prepare to welcome Jeff, we will be sending off our congregation's ministry candidate, Kathryn Lester-Bacon. She will be ordained in worship here on Saturday, October 12 at 3 p.m. All are invited, not only to the service, but also to the reception that follows. The service is not on Sunday morning so that other ministers and church members in the Presbytery can attend without missing worship at their home congregations. An invitation is enclosed as an insert to this newsletter.

With both Jeff and Kate, we are reminded of the blessings of being part of a larger connectional church. Jeff was prepared for his ministry through First Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak, Michigan, through a Presbyterian seminary supported by many individuals and congregations, and through the churches he has served as a student in Chicago. Kate, in turn, has not only been shaped by this congregation, but also by congregations in Baltimore and Richmond, a Presbyterian campus ministry in college, a Presbyterian seminary, field placements in Presbyterian congregations while in seminary, as well as her first post-seminary position as a director for youth ministry. This is why her ordination is an act of not just this congregation but the whole Presbyterian Church.

These are exciting times and we have much for which to be thankful!

### **CROP Walk—Sunday, October 13**



- Elected Jane Barndt as Clerk Pro Tem for the congregational meeting on September 22.
- Approved a new mission statement for the Endowment Fund, and approved transfer of the Mabel Leaf Trust to Glenmede, which manages the rest of the Endowment. The Trust will be separately tracked. Elected Gina James and David Allebach to serve on the Endowment Committee and expressed thanks for Dick Clark’s service on the Committee.

- Received a report from the Admin. ## Kitchen Korner

This is the first of a series of short articles to address the use of our kitchen and also to provide some reminders of how to prepare and serve food safely. We are blessed to have such a wonderful kitchen and one that is used so often. But with its use comes some responsibility and the need for communication.

A question that I get the most is what to do with leftover food. After hosting an event or serving community meals everyone is tired and just ready to get out of the kitchen. The difficult decision is what to do with leftover hot and cold foods. Food begins to spoil when it is in the range of 41 and 135 degrees. So it is very important that after the meal is served that you act quickly to divide a casserole, salad, etc. and get in to smaller containers and then refrigerate until you are leaving. Certainly it is fine for you to take that food home for your own use. The difficulty is giving it to others who may not be so prompt in refrigerating the food quickly when they return home. Time and temperature will be explained further in a future article but if you have a specific question in regards to this please feel free to contact me.


The real issue is what to do with the leftover cakes, cookies, ice cream, condiments, salad dressings, etc. Certainly it makes sense that these items should be left to be used by others. But this is where the communication needs to come in. All items that are left need to be marked with the date and the request that someone **please use**. And then if you are planning an event please stop in to check the refrigerator and freezer to see what is available and put a note on items with your name or place in a grocery bag saying **please do not use**. This will save you money and most importantly keep so much food from being wasted. If it is baked goods which are left it is so important that they are wrapped very well. A tray of cookies with a light covering of saran is just going to get freezer burn and will end up in the trash.

There are permanent markers and labels placed in the drawer in the butcher block cabinet for your use. And if you have an excess of baked goods or something else please leave a note on the butcher block counter for Peggy to let her know that there are things to be used. Thanks so much for your help in making our kitchen run efficiently!
